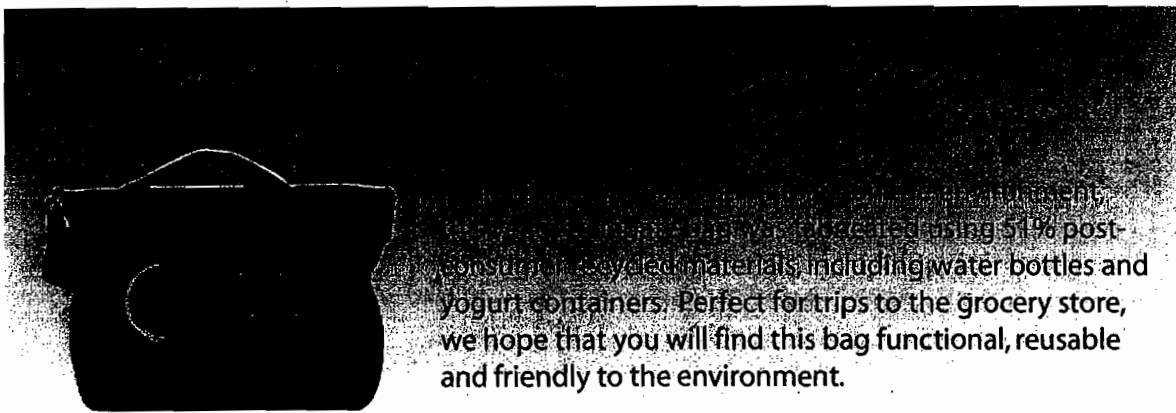


13:00-17:00 **Sharing Research: Preparing to Publish** **Suite 306, WTCC**

The CIHR-Institute of Population and Public Health supports the Centres for Research Development Program, including seven centres, which have received infrastructure support to understand and address the impacts of physical and social environments (or places such as workplaces, schools, communities) on the health of communities and populations. Centres are jointly co-governed by researchers and research users (e.g., policy makers, practitioners from government and non-governmental sectors) in an effort to maximize the effective application and use of knowledge into policies, programs and practices to improve population health and reduce inequalities. This half-day symposium will feature lessons learned to date gleaned from the Centres' innovative research and knowledge translation programs. Several of the Centres are addressing the impact of urban and rural places, as well as neighbourhood effects on the health of vulnerable populations. The focus is not only on understanding what determines the influences of factors that shape the places in which we live, play, work and learn but on improving the effectiveness and cost-effectiveness of policy and program interventions which shape them.
